



House Report

I would like to thank all members for coming out and enjoying the club this year. As we rolled out of COVID restrictions we faced new challenges along with much of the country. Staffing levels were constantly changing which made things challenging all year. I am happy to say that through it all we made some great improvements to help bring along a better member experience, including:

- 8 more HEPA filters for the ballroom to help keep folks safe during the many events that we planned on having this year.
- Instituted a uniform program so that all employees would be easily recognizable in their navy tops and name badges.
- Replaced outdated keg lines and expanded our taps to a 6-tap system.
- With the new tap system, we started to offer a variety of craft beers including several IPA's that have been very popular.
- Purchased new growlers and pint glasses with our new logos
- First Lady Poulson did an excellent job with offering new AYC and Main Sail logo wear including youth options. Be sure to check out the new fall and winter options. These make great Christmas gifts for all of your AYC family and friends.
- We also can call this the year of the cooler. We replaced the glass chiller, under-cabinet bar fridge with a window doored unit, a beer chest cooler, the fridge unit in our beer walk-in cooler, and repaired both our walk-in cooler and freezer in the kitchen and added an under flat-top refrigeration unit to allow quicker access to food.
- We replaced a terribly outdated counter area in the kitchen creating more usable workspace in the center of the kitchen.
- Opened the pool six days a week.

We recently hired a new maintenance person who is making major improvements to our facilities. He has started with some behind the scenes organization of maintenance areas and has since moved to working on outside items. I am confident we will all notice major improvements in the months to come. I also would like to thank a few folks that without a doubt helped make my job easier this year.

I would like to thank Rick and Cindy Artino for the countless hours they have volunteered this summer. It became clear very early on this summer that I needed to focus on the running of the restaurant/bar and they quickly stepped up to take on responsibility of all member and guest events. They helped ensure that many of the members who brought their events to the club had great experiences.

Thank you to Mike Burkhart for all that he did with the grounds this year. He made sure the pool looked great and organized all the maintenance around the grounds. He also got us new tables in the lounge. If any of you have sat at one of the round folding tables and had to straddle the leg you will notice that the legs are gone. Thank you Mike for all that you do.

I would like to thank the brewery committee for all their hard work this year. This group single handedly changed the future of our club by aligning us with current beer market trends. As the industry transitions to craft beer, we are now set to capitalize on the hard work of this group. Thank you to Mike Pickens, Josh Hunker and Sean Hinkle for all that you have done this year in the conversion of the brewery.

Brewery Report

This year was a very busy year for the Main Sail Brewery. We saw the responsibility of the brewery change hands for the first time in 20 years and we took on a very large project that is already proving to be beneficial to the club and its membership.

A well-deserved thank you goes out to Curt Adams for his 20 years as the Brewmaster of the Main Sail Brewery. Early this year, Curt decided to retire and pass along the brewery responsibilities to Josh Hunker and Sean Hinkle. Thank you, Josh and Sean, for taking on this challenge. We all know you will do well in this new role.

Key Accomplishments:

- Installed new tap lines from the cooler to the bar, increasing from 3 lines to 6 lines
- Installed a new tap system, increasing the number of taps at the bar from 3 taps to 6 taps
- Completed a transfer of equipment with Hoodletown Brewing Company that began in March.
 - This allowed AYC to reduce the capacity of the brewery equipment from 10BBL to 5BBL
 - Provides the flexibility to produce a wider variety of craft beers, provide a fresher product, and operate with a more energy-efficient process.
 - The club incurred no expense during the completion of this project, which also included an additional walk-in cooler
- Purchased an additional 20 kegs to accommodate the growth of the brewery
- Purchased 13-ounce glasses to reduce the serving size of the higher ABV beers

NEW Craft beers brewed in 2021:

- *Cope's Kolsch*– in honor of our first AYC Commodore, Frank Cope
- *Main Sail Scottish Ale*– An AYC classic
- *Yachtoberfest*– AYC's Oktoberfest beer

Treasurer Report

INTRODUCTION

Year over year financial performance Profit and Loss Financial Reports through August month end close reveal the following:

Profit and Loss:

- **Total Income** is favorable to prior year by 38%, or \$218K, driven by exceptional growth in membership, which result in increased usage of the Clubs facilities. 2021 Budget membership was set at 353, actual membership through August is at 375.
- **Cost of Goods Sold** is increased over prior year by \$128K, or 46% with increases in all categories except Purchases Main Sail, Purchase Club Events and Club Activities. The increase is proportional to the year over year growth in membership.
- **Gross Profit** year over year is favorable by 32% or \$90K.
- **Expenses** are increase year over year by 44%, or by \$105K – primary drivers of the increased expenses include,
- **Merchant fees** – proportional to member increase and increase in sales
- **Repairs** – Supplies/Pool – due to national shortage of pool chemicals, and required repairs to pool
- **Wages Exempt Employees** – the conversion of the Sous Chef from hourly to salary is one primary driver of this increased expense
- **Other expenses** related to exterior capital refresh project – which included pool house upgrade, upgrade of house boat electrical feed, and pool deck repairs.
- **Net Income** year to date is favorable YTD at \$12.7K.

Balance Sheet -see attached Aug ME Balance Sheet

- Continuing with the work starting in 2020, there was a continued focus at clearing up prior period issues from the balance sheet.
- Banking Accounts – current account balances are significantly stronger than prior year.

Building & Grounds Report

In 2021 the Buildings and Grounds Committee was actively involved in helping maintain the facility along with facilitating necessary repairs to both the building and the exterior landscaping. Some of the major highlights from this year include:

- Swimming Pool
 - No citations from the health department
 - Realized a savings on regular maintenance with a low-cost contract with Martinelli for weekly maintenance
 - Pool was operational all summer with no major shutdowns due to maintenance issues
- Completed repairs and upgrades to the pool house including replacement of siding and painting, installation of new doors with repairs and painting of the floors
- Upgraded the electrical service to the Houseboat docks
- Made repairs to men's front locker room that eliminated the constant off odors, upgraded the piping and drainage
- Secured donations of materials to repair the front driveway
- Installed the new sign purchased last year including upgraded lighting and landscaping with the help of Rick Artino
- Contracted with NEOPs building management company to maintain the grounds and secured the company as a business member to the club
- With generous donation from Past Commodore Jim Demuth we were able to repair the boat launch and upgrade the driveway leading to the ramp. Also ground out stumps so we could install the new playground
- Also, with a donation from Mr. Demuth we applied a stone mulch around the tree bed adjacent to the parking lot
- Painted the steps on the porch and pool house as Rick Artino did this for us.
- Facilitated the jetting of the grease trap and lines that were clogged leading to the sewer line in the front yard
- With donated labor from Jim Demuth – Tuscon construction we removed a large stump and cleared a spot for the installation of the new playground.
- In the Main Ball Room moved the wires and upgraded the lights.
- Received a donation from the Dipietro's as they donated tables for the lounge.
- Was in the interview with Aaron and Sean on hiring the new handyman Jarod as he is working out great.
- Special thanks to Rick Artino for all the help, Brian D. with his help on the pool and whatever I asked him to help with. Paul Rozler as he helped when asked.
- And many others.

Docks Report

Thanks to all for a great year at AYC! This season we added the 200 series which consist of 24 slips and new gangway. These were added to the western edge of the property to maximize capacity while still allowing for easy navigation.

Fingers were added to the west side of the courtesy dock to increase the capacity for those boating over to use the club facilities. A big thank you to Beaver's Marine for donating the docks to make these slips longer and more user friendly. I would also like to thank them for donating the mooring buoys for safely tying off while raising and lowering sails for the one design sailboats.

A new courtesy dock was added between the 300 series and the boat ramp for use by sailboats and houseboats only. This helps to alleviate some of the congestion at the courtesy dock in front of the club. We are keep pushing forward for the continuous improvement of our docking systems. Many of the docks are in need of new hardware, deck boards or floats.

The need for docking is at an all-time high; most of the marinas at the local lakes have waiting lists in place. This year we only have 7 slips open of the 151 slips available. Members who currently don't have a dock but are needing one next year, or current dockers who won't need their dock next year, please contact Jeff Yohe as soon as possible at jjyohe@gmail.com.

Unfortunately, the end of the boating season is approaching quickly. All boats will need to be off the Atwood Yacht Club docks by October 31st to prepare for dock removal at the end of the season.

Sailing Fleet Report

The Sailing Fleet had another fun and exciting season, with loads of club races on Wednesdays and Sundays running from May through October, a very well-attended Harvest Moon Regatta, and a successful Atwood Cup Regatta.

In a completely opposite turn from last year, weekly club races were a little more challenging this year due to the weather. Many of the Wednesday races were cancelled due to rain or lack of wind. On the Wednesdays we did have, MC Scow participation was good with an average of 6-7 boats in attendance. Cruising fleet participation on Wednesdays was minimal, with generally only 2 boats in attendance—partially due to some cruising sailors moving to the MC Scow fleet, and partially due to less interest or less availability on Wednesday evenings. The Sunday series went off very well, with good attendance from both fleets.

The MC Scow fleet has continued to grow this season with even more members jumping into boats, which has pushed the fleet to 22 boats, up from 16 at this time last year. Bruce Moore continues to provide guidance and wisdom as the MC Master/Godfather/GOAT, but his apprentices, Neil Beavers, Tyler Rippel, and Reno Yoder are an unstoppable force for good in growing this fleet. It has been great to see the level of excitement as the fleet grows locally, and also great to see Atwood Yacht Club being represented at National Regattas and other MC regattas around the region.

The club hosted two great regattas so far this year, the Atwood Cup and Harvest Moon. The Atwood Cup Regatta has been a mainstay at Atwood for several decades which had been traditionally sponsored by the Sailing Buckeyes Yacht Club. This is the second year AYC has hosted the regatta. The Atwood Cup is a charity regatta which has raised many thousands of dollars for worthy causes over the years; most recently the focus has been to raise money for AYC's Junior Sailing program through the Muskingum Watershed Conservancy Foundation. Boats from all across the lake are invited to join in the regatta, with each boat soliciting donations from sponsors. We were originally going to sail the Atwood Cup at the beginning of June, but we found that many boats were not yet launched, and several others were unavailable. We decided to reschedule to the end of September, and it turned out to be an awesome day of racing with 10 cruising boats on the starting line—matching the number at the Harvest Moon this year. Through the efforts of the sailing crews and the generosity of 32 different sponsors, we were able to raise \$4000 for the Junior Sailing Program at the Atwood Cup, topping last year's total by over \$800. A huge congratulations goes to Nate and Janelle Snedden and Dan Hupp for racing HeatWave to a 1st place finish after a couple year hiatus from racing.

The 71st annual Harvest Moon Regatta was another success this year with a lot of good racing, and an outstanding social event. I wasn't around in 1950 (or 1960, or 70, or 80), but I think it may be safe to say that this year was the first year we hosted a wedding as part of the Harvest Moon. It was great to see the camaraderie amongst the Thistle fleet in supporting two of their beloved members as guests at their wedding, and competitors out on the water. This year, we had 46 boats in attendance and about 120 total crew members racing, which continued the trend of increased participation, outpacing last year's attendance and is the highest we've had in at least the last 10 years. I can't thank the membership and staff of AYC enough for its help in ensuring the Regatta went off without a hitch. Over 50 volunteers from across the club worked together to host an outstanding event.

To close out the season, we are going to try our luck again at racing the second (first?) annual Atwood Autumnal MC Scow regatta on October 30. We will again invite the diehard off-lake MC sailors to join the AYC fleet for one last hurrah before the boats are tarped and sealed for the long winter. This year, we hope to have a great turnout, and not just from the Dellroy Fire and Search and Rescue.

Big thanks to Gary and Judy Lenhart and the entire of the Junior Sailing Committee who did a great job adapting the program this year to be a more sustainable event for the volunteers, while still delivering a top-notch program to educate our youth in sailing and boating safety. I need to thank so many people who come together to make all these events happen; it is truly a team effort.

Thanks to the Board and Membership for continuing to support the first tenant of AYC's mission statement: "to encourage the sport of yachting and boating, to teach and instruct in the science of seamanship and navigation". A huge thanks go to Bill and Barb Singhaus, who served as race committee week after week for most of the 80 or so races we held this summer. Thanks to Darryll and Dee Headley for continuing to lead the dirty job of placing and removing race marks. Thanks again to Bruce, Neil, Tyler for leading the MC Scow fleet. Respectfully Submitted,

Hello, my name is Gary Lenhart. My wife Judy and I chair the Jr Sailing program. We have been involved with Jr Sailing for the past 12 years.

It's been a great way to meet new people, many of who become Jr Sailing Volunteers. This year alone we have had more than 45 people volunteer. We also have a committee of 20 people that guides our program and makes important decisions.

Last year, one of those decisions was to cancel our overnight camps due to covid. This year after considering a lot of options we decided a day camp would be a much better option.

The two four day camps were attended by 48 kids who all learned to sail and had a great time doing it. After the camps, the Beavers and Rippel families organized a series of Saturday morning races for the kids who attended the camps past or present and could continue to improve their sailing skills.

Day camps were a good improvement that solved many problems. We were able to do everything we did in the past and based everything at the pavilion leaving the patio and dinning room available for the club to use as needed. There was no burden on the kitchen to supply three meals a day with special dietary needs. Best of all the volunteers and kids were more rested every day.

We were also able to lower the cost to attend because we had less expenses. The Jr Sailing group pays for all the State boat registrations and MWCD stickers for club owned boats. There are 25 Sunfish, 2 runabouts, and a MC Scow.

The small fees the Jr Sailing program charges pay all of the cost of the camps and it has not cost the club any money for the past ten years.

As always thank you for supporting Jr Sailing. We have had a lot of unbelievable kids attend our camps and go on to do great things with their lives. Best of all they often take time from their busy schedules to return as volunteers and they give credit to attending our camps for inspiring them to become good people.
